3.) HAWNY Senior Program Manager Tracy Schmidt Discusses Federal Funding Advocacy

We would like to give everyone an update on funding and advocacy

There are two major HUD Grant programs including ESG and CoC programming

ESG Funds: Emergency Shelter, Street Outreach, RRH, Homeless Prevention Funding

CoC Funds: Rapid Rehousing, Joint Transitional Housing, Coordinated Entry Lead, HMIS Lead, CoC Lead Agency, Permanent Supportive Housing

The President released a “Skinny Budget” that would consolidate CoC Funding under ESG funding and would also completely eliminate CoC funded programming

This would include Permanent Supportive Housing, Which would eliminate housing for many of the most vulnerable people in our community.

We need your help to protect the most vulnerable in our community.

Following the President's Proposal, the House and Senate will deliberate. During this time, changes to the proposal are made

Over the next four weeks we will be sending you action items to help advocate for this funding. Participation is voluntary, but Volume matters!

4.) Homeless Alliance HMIS Director Nate Pyzikiewicz Presents Point-in-Time and Housing Inventory Count Data

The annual Point-in-Time data collection takes time to count, consolidate and report data. I will be summarizing some of our findings from the data.

We will also be summarizing the Housing Inventory Count Data

As a reminder: the Pit Count is a snapshot of how many people are experiencing (sheltered and unsheltered) homelessness on a single night in January.

The Housing Inventory Count (HIC) is a point-in-time bed and unit inventory count of projects within a CoC that are dedicated to individuals experiencing homelessness.

The PIT and HIC are reporting on the following data points:

- 1.) Overall numbers of sheltered and unsheltered clients
- 2.) Household Composition: Adult, Adult and Children, Children only
- 3.) Subpopulations: Chronic Homelessness, Veterans, DV, etc
- 4.) Bed Inventories: Number of bed and units available in each project
- 5.) Methodologies: How we plan and conduct the HIC and PIT count

Findings:

This year we saw a 14% increase in people experiencing homelessness

There was a 219 person increase in the last year.

We saw a large increase in adult with children households (Family)

We are seeing more families become homeless

Inventories: since 2022 we have seen a large increase in Hotel/Motel beds

Housing projects RRH and PSH have relatively static capacity, resulting in a bottleneck of clients waiting for housing.

Takeaways: There is a need to increase non DSS shelters, specifically family shelters

Affordable Housing is more important than ever

Street Outreach projects continue to be vital in connecting community to services
