


Homeless Alliance of WNY

Continuum of Care (CoC) and the administrator
of the Homeless Management Information
System (HMIS) for the cities of Buffalo and
Niagara Falls, and Erie, Niagara, Orleans, Genesee
and Wyoming counties. HAWNY is also the Lead
Agency for Coordinated Entry.

Vision: A community committed to ending homelessness.





Homelessness Among Older Adults

- Chronic health issues appear 15-20 years
 earlier than adults who are housed
- Adults experiencing homelessness are often considered to be "older adults" at age 50





New York State Trends

More than **14,000 adults over the age of 55 experienced homelessness in New York State** in 2024

Nearly 1,700 adults over the age of 55 experienced unsheltered homelessness in New York State in 2024




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NY-508 CoC Trends & Data

15% of individuals experiencing homelessness in Western New York are 55 and older.

More than 300 lack health insurance

More than 150 are veterans



Pathways into Homelessness

Aging into Homelessness



Individuals experience homelessness as younger adults and remain homeless as they age

First-time Homelessness



Older adults who face a crisis later in life that leads to them experiencing homelessness for the first time in their lives



Contributing Factors



Rising Housing Costs

Buffalo Fair Market Rent - One-Bedroom:

• 2019: \$695/month

• 2024: \$992/month



Shortage of Affordable Housing

Buffalo lacks approximately 8,500
 affordable housing units



Insufficient Average Monthly Benefits

Average SSI benefit for adults 65+ in NYS:
 \$574/month



Other Risk Factors

Social isolation

Loss of a relationship

Living "doubled-up"





Top Reported Reasons for Homelessness among Older Adults in Western New York



Eviction

The top reported reason for homelessness among adults age 55 and older in NY-508 CoC.



Release from an institution



Mental health



Dementia

- Homelessness is a risk factor for and a consequence of Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias
- Experiencing homelessness increases the risk of developing dementia, while the onset of dementia increases the likelihood of experiencing homelessness



Elder Abuse



Elder abuse is an overlooked risk factor for homelessness

The risk factors for elder abuse are also risk factors for homelessness

Medical, functional, or cognitive decline Loss of financial independence



Unique Challenges and Barriers for Older Adults



Activities of Daily Living (ADLs)



Mobility limitations and accessibility barriers

• Fall and injury risks



Difficulty re-entering the workforce

 Ageism, Lack of training and education, and Gaps in work history



Preventing and Addressing Homelessness among Older Adults

- 1. Eviction prevention
- 2.Increase access to Social Security benefits
- 3. Legal assistance
- 4. Rent subsidies and emergency rental assistance
- 5. Addressing health and healthcare needs
- 6. Collaboration between aging agencies, housing systems, community partners and government entities
