A Message from the Executive Director...

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the Homeless Alliance of Western New York. As I reflect on this milestone, I think about the people, partnerships, and persistence that have shaped this journey. What began as a small coordinating body has grown into a network of more than 300 partner agencies, all rooted in one deeply held conviction: a community committed to ending homelessness.

Over time, we've built a stronger, more connected system—one that this year brings **\$23.7 million through the federal Continuum of Care program to Western New York**. These funds support housing and services for more than 1,700 individuals and families each year. Behind those numbers are real stories: a veteran who finally breathes easier, a parent able to tuck their child in at night, someone who no longer has to choose between medicine and rent.

I've been reminded recently of a line from *The Nightingale* by Kristin Hannah:

"In love we find out who we want to be; in war we find out who we are."

In this work, love defines our vision—what kind of community we want to build. But it's in the struggle, the fight for what's right, that we discover who we truly are. The challenges of this past year—shifting federal priorities, funding uncertainty, and rising housing costs—have revealed our community's true character: resilient, compassionate, and unwilling to give in.

Even amid change, the Alliance has stepped forward to fill critical gaps—strengthening coordination, expanding access to essential services, and ensuring that no one falls through the cracks. I see people across Western New York showing up every day with heart, integrity, and hope. The Alliance is proud to stand beside you—to coordinate, to amplify, and to lead.

As we look ahead, the work will not be easy—but I know who we are. We are a community that fights for what's right, leads with love, and acts boldly. Together, we'll continue building a future where homelessness is rare, brief, and nonrecurring.

To everyone who has walked beside us these 20 years—thank you. Your trust and commitment make this work possible. Together, we carry forward not only the legacy of the past but also the promise of what's to come.

WEST SIDE HOMES COMPLETE; \$23 MILLION PROJECT IN DOWNTOWN BUFFALO



New York Governor Kathy Hochul announced the completion of West Side Homes on Sept. 30, a \$23 million affordable and supportive housing development in the city of Buffalo. The project includes 11 new buildings constructed on vacant lots.

The West Side Homes project creates 49 affordable apartments, including 16 with supportive services for individuals struggling with homelessness.

“Every New Yorker deserves a safe, affordable place to call home, and West Side Homes is a testament to our unwavering commitment to making that a reality in Buffalo,” Hochul said. “This \$23 million development was constructed with direct input from residents and contributes to the continued revitalization on the city’s West Side. Today’s announcement demonstrates how my administration is creating pathways to prosperity for families as part of our historic \$25 billion housing plan.”

West Side Homes consists of 11 new buildings on vacant lots featuring 45 affordable apartments and the substantial rehabilitation of two two-family buildings. The development sites were chosen through a 2017 planning process, led by BNSC, in which West Side residents identified areas where energy-efficient affordable housing could be constructed. The 13 sites are spread over an approximately two-mile area. All 49 apartments at West Side Homes are affordable to households earning at or below 50 percent of the Area Median Income.

Sixteen apartments with supportive services are reserved for households struggling with homelessness. These residents have access to on-site supportive services and rental subsidies funded through the Empire State Supportive Housing Initiative and administered by the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports (OASAS), including care management and behavioral health treatment services.

Residential amenities include laundry facilities, porches, balconies and community space. The development includes five apartments that are fully accessible for people with mobility impairments and two apartments that are equipped for people with hearing and visual impairments.



AMY'S PLACE OF HOPE NOW A REALITY IN BUFFALO'S EAST SIDE



The ribbon has been cut and the doors are now officially open for a truly special development in the east side of Buffalo!

The celebration of the grand opening of Build Promise's Amy's Place of Hope took place on October 9 in front of a packed crowd that was eager to see the 24,000 square foot state-of-the-art, men's homeless shelter in one of the hardest hit areas in the city of Buffalo.

The facility, located at 1297 Sycamore Street, features 96 semi-private beds, 80 code blue beds for when the weather is freezing, as well as shower, laundry and medical services that are directly on-site.

"We'll be able to offer everything from mental health services to peer services to medical services to job training here," Sam DiVincenzo, executive director of Build Promise told WKBW. "Emergency beds for men. We'll have all this. We have the...

...VA hospital. The DMV has committed to being here to help everybody with a driver's license. The Erie County Department of Social Services – never before have they been in a satellite building."

Build Promise will be collaborating with a number of community partners to offer a host of additional on-site resources that include mental health care, dental care, legal assistance and housing placement.

Those organizations include Jericho Road, BestSelf Behavioral Services, OLV Human Services, Evergreen Health, Feedmore WNY, US Department of Veterans Affairs, Mental Health Advocates of WNY, The Restoration Society, Neighborhood Legal Services, and others.

The facility will also features other important resources like family and financial literacy along with haircuts so guests can look their best as they get back on their feet.

The shelter honors the legacy of Amy Betros, co-founder of St. Luke's Mission of Mercy, who passed away unexpectedly this past Spring.



NYS HOMES AND COMMUNITY RENEWAL ANNOUNCES OPENING OF 150-UNIT AFFORDABLE HOUSING DEVELOPMENT



New York State Homes and Community Renewal Commissioner RuthAnne Visnauskas announced the completion of Pan-American Square Apartments on Thursday, October 16, a \$93 million, 150-unit affordable housing development in Buffalo.

The development consists of three newly-constructed buildings located on the city's westside near the site of the World's Fair in 1901. More than half of the apartments are supportive Single-Room Occupancy units and there are several apartments reserved for seniors.

Pan-American Square Apartments continues this effort and complements Governor Hochul's \$25 billion five-year housing plan, which is on track to create or preserve 100,000 affordable homes statewide.

"Our investment in Pan-American Square Apartments highlights two of our most important goals – it creates 150 much-needed affordable and modern apartments, and it ensures households who need support will have access to the tools and resources that help them live independently," Visnauskas said. "As the revitalization of Buffalo continues, we thank our many state and local partners for making this project a reality, and we look forward to our continued work in communities across Western NY."

Apartments at Pan-American Square are available to households earning up to 60 percent of the Area Median Income. There are 100 supportive apartments for vulnerable residents and those struggling with homelessness, as well as seniors age 55 and older in need of support services. Of these supportive apartments, 80 are Single Room Occupancy units, which are one room that also contains a sink and stove with access to a shared bathroom in the public corridor. On-site support services are provided by DePaul Community Services including case management, healthcare coordination, transportation, community integration, and independent living skills education.

"For individuals experiencing homelessness, mental illness or substance use disorders, access to housing and support can be life changing. It provides a foundation for recovery, stability, and a better quality of life." NYS Health Commissioner Dr. James McDonald said.

VFW DONATES \$50,000 TO WNY HOMELESS VETERANS' HEALTH SERVICES

In a display of solidarity and compassion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) has announced a \$50,000 donation to support health services for homeless veterans in Western New York.

This generous gift represents not only a tangible investment in the well-being of those who have served but also a powerful affirmation of the enduring bonds that unite veterans across generations and backgrounds.

"At a time when the challenges faced by homeless veterans are more urgent than ever, this act of giving stands as a beacon of hope — a reminder that the call to serve does not end with military discharge, but echoes through continued acts of kindness and advocacy, living up to our motto: 'No one does more for veterans,'" VFW officials said in a statement.



17TH ANNUAL PROJECT HOMELESS CONNECT ANOTHER GREAT SUCCESS

Over 100 service providers gathered at the Buffalo Convention Center back on Sept. 19 to offer housing assistance, medical care, mental health services and other crucial resources to the city's homeless population during the 17th annual Project Homeless Connect.

The one-day event comes as homelessness continues to surge across Western New York. A report from the state comptroller in January shows roughly 1,500 people are homeless in the region - an 81 percent jump between 2022 and 2024.

The event offered a wide range of services, from housing assistance and mental health support to dental care and free haircuts.

"As rates of homelessness have surged across the nation in recent years, it has become more important than ever that we extend a helping hand to our unhoused neighbors," common council member Zeneta B. Everhart said.

"Project Homeless Connect Buffalo is an opportunity to provide these essential services, helping to meet these individuals' basic needs and equipping them with the assistance and resources to maintain stable housing. I thank Project Homeless Connect Buffalo for their hard work and compassion in providing lifesaving assistance to some of the most vulnerable individuals in our community."

BUFFALO BILLS' HUDDLE FOR HUNGER HAS RECORD-BREAKING YEAR



The Buffalo Bills Foundation partnered with Wegmans Food Markets and 20 different Huddle for Hunger nonprofits that work to provide food access to communities around Western New York.

In 2025, a record-breaking 65,100 pounds of food were donated to the 2025 Huddle for Hunger Community Food Drive to support FeedMore WNY and its nearly 400 hunger-relief partners throughout Erie, Niagara, Cattaraugus and Chautauqua counties. This year's Huddle for Hunger totals surpassed the previous record by more than 27,000 pounds. The annual Huddle for Hunger Drive is made possible through the collaboration of the Buffalo Bills Foundation and Wegmans.

Highlights from the 2025 Huddle for Hunger campaign included:

- The Community Food Drive & Festival at Highmark Stadium on September 30 saw 65,107 total pounds of food donated for the Western New York Community



- An additional 1,030 pounds of food was collected from the fans of both Jamestown and Bennett in a Rivalries Week Celebration on October 3.



- \$171,656 was raised for the 20 Huddle for Hunger charities as the Bills took on the Patriots on October 5.

The Buffalo Bills Foundation is focused on addressing hunger, increasing access to nutritious food for families and supporting healthy eating in the Western New York region.

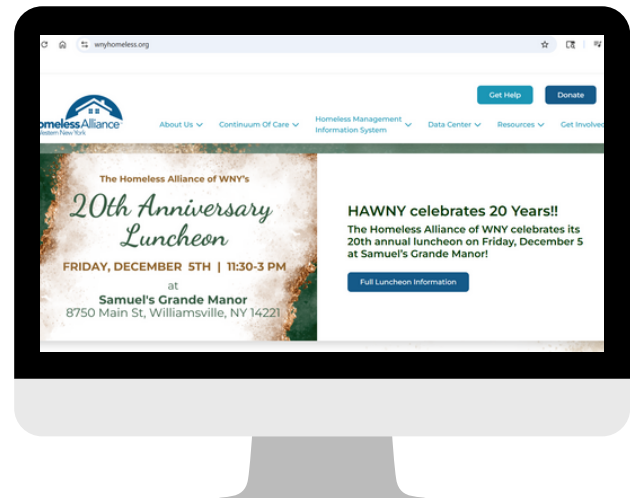
