Nyla Gaylord has devoted more than four decades to human services, driven by a deep commitment to helping people whom systems often overlook. Beginning her career in 1980 with Rural New York Farmworker Opportunities—now PathStone—where she worked with migrant farmworkers. Subsequent jobs included working with refugees, older workers, displaced homemakers, people with disabilities, and individuals facing addiction, unemployment, and mental health challenges. Across every role, she saw a constant truth: people cannot address employment, health, or recovery without a safe place to stay. Housing advocacy has undergirded her work, even when it wasn't in her job description. A defining early moment came early on in her career when she fought for emergency shelter for a migrant family forced from their labor camp. After exhausting all options, she confronted the farmer directly—learning, in that moment, the power of advocacy and "good trouble." She credits colleagues like Velma Smith for shaping her stance on advocacy, and belief that no client should be "jerked around" or denied help for which they were entitled. In recent years, Nyla has led community-wide efforts in Orleans County to address the shortage of housing and rising homelessness. Following the 2022 Holley Hotel closure, she convened local partners for a "Community Conversation on Housing," ultimately helping launch the county's first Warming Center in 2023. As an adoptive mother and foster parent Nyla has been on both sides of the desk. Four of the 12 children that were once in her care have experienced homelessness as

adults, and thanks to her advocacy are homeless no more.

I have dedicated my career on making a difference in the community. I am driven by a passion to serve and support individuals in need, and I found fulfillment in helping people rebuild their lives. Over the years, I have seen firsthand the impact of systematic issues on individuals and families, and I have been motivated to be a part of the solution. I have had the opportunity to work with incredible colleagues and organizations, and together we have made a real difference in our community My experience has taught me the importance of compassion, empathy, and resilience and I am proud to have been a part of this work. I would like to extend my gratitude to Spectrum Health and Human Services for the opportunities and support I've received during my 25 years with the agency. am thankful for the experience and skills I've gained and the impact it has had on my career.



I am still at Compass House 29 years later and am now an Assistant Resource Center Director and Case Manager and continue to do the work I am most passionate about; working with homeless youth.

Living Opportunities of DePaul

After receiving my master's degree from Buffalo State College in 1987, I worked for about 3 years for a residential agency in the southern tier. During that time, I managed a geriatric Group home for adults with serious mental illness. Most of those individuals had spent 35 years or more in the State hospital. In 1990, I began working for DePaul and have been there ever since. DePaul primarily houses/serves adult individuals with a serious mental illness. DePaul is also a developer of affordable housing, and we serve additional populations such as those who are homeless, those who possess substance abuse disorders, those who are indigent, those who are older adults, and veterans. During my almost 36 years of working at DePaul, I have learned that anywhere from 30-45% of the homeless people across the Country have some form of a mental illness. I think the reason for this is that many people with serious mental illness do not receive proper treatment and therefore, cycle in and out of psychiatric emergency rooms, homeless shelters, and often lose their housing due to their unmanaged psychiatric symptoms. What is most satisfying for me is to personally witness many of these same individuals, be able to turn their lives around, and living meaningful and productive lives.

Dan has spent more than 24 years serving the residents of Erie County, dedicating his career to supporting older adults, individuals facing homelessness, and anyone at risk of losing stable housing. He has worked extensively to help people maintain their independence, prevent housing loss, and access the essential resources needed to meet their basic needs. Throughout his career, Dan has partnered with community professionals, service providers, and advocates to address the complex challenges that often accompany inadequate housing — including addiction, mental health concerns, and the realities of aging. His hands-on experience has shown him that homelessness is not a distant issue but a very real risk for people of all ages who struggle to get by. These experiences continue to motivate Dan's commitment to providing compassionate, person-centered support and empowering individuals to overcome barriers, achieve stability, and improve their quality of life.

graduated from Buffalo State University and began my career with Living Opportunities in a Community Residence in 1992. During those early years, I gained invaluable insight into mental health, witnessing firsthand both the struggles and the remarkable resilience of the individuals we served. In 1998, Living Opportunities received funding to launch a Transitional Housing Program, and I was entrusted with locating and securing apartments for homeless individuals with behavioral health needs, while also conducting outreach presentations in shelters and hospitals. Over the decades, our organization has expanded services into multiple counties, a clear reflection of the ongoing and unmet demand for support. While I now hold many supervisory responsibilities, the most meaningful part of my work remains maintaining a caseload and engaging directly with clients. Their courage, perseverance, and stories have not only inspired me but have profoundly shaped who I am. They remind me daily why this work matters.

I've always felt a calling to support people experiencing homelessness, even as a young girl. Volunteering at—and later working at—Friends of Night People showed me how much more I wanted to do and how deeply this work mattered. Over the years, many meaningful moments have stayed with me—especially doing outreach alongside someone who had once been a "client." Their wisdom and resilience taught me so much; one of their sayings is even framed in my office. Helping people move from crisis to shelter or permanent housing continues to motivate me every day. I've also been fortunate to work with incredible colleagues, partners, and the individuals we serve. This work is hard, and it happens only when many people come together with compassion and commitment. What has kept me going for more than 20 years is having a strong support system—especially my husband, Jason, who has encouraged every project and passion I've pursued and has even done outreach with me.
