The Reality



Homelessness and housing insecurities are on the rise across the United States, affecting our neighbors at an alarming rate. This crisis is a result of decades of insufficient investment in affordable housing, historic inflation, stagnated wages, and more.

The practice of criminalizing homelessness often results in significant costs, including increased expenditures on the legal system, incarceration, and emergency services, all while failing to address the root causes of homelessness. Moreover, it exacerbates the challenges faced by the most vulnerable populations—unsheltered individuals—by compounding their trauma and instability. Instead of receiving the compassionate care and support needed for healing and recovery, they are further marginalized, deepening the cycle of hardship.



Homelessness in WNY



6.5k individuals and families experience homelessness in WNY every year.

83% of people experiencing homelessness in WNY are single adults.

Most of them are men.

1.7k children throughout WNY are experiencing homelessness right now.

70% of families in WNY who experience homelessness are led by single mothers.

36% of people who experience homelessness in WNY are **25-44 years old.**



It's Ineffective.



Nearly all people experiencing homelessness are NOT unsheltered by choice - but because they lack access to affordable housing, physical and mental health care, or adequate and humane emergency shelter.

Arrests, fines, jail time, and criminal records make it harder for those experiencing homelessness to access the affordable housing, health services, and employment necessary to exit homelessness.





Experiencing Homelessness with a Disability

48 % of people experiencing homelessness in WNY report having at least one disability.





It's Dehumanizing.



Laws contributing to the involuntary institutionalization of those experiencing homelessness have regularly been found to violate the civil rights of people with disabilities and any expansion of those laws would expand the harm they cause.









It's Expensive.



A growing body of research demonstrates that providing affordable housing and voluntary services is more cost-effective than outdated approaches, including criminalization.

A study in Charlotte, NC found that the city saved \$2.4 million in the year after creating their Housing First program. Housing First prioritizes providing stable, permanent housing to individuals experiencing homelessness as a first step, without preconditions such as sobriety or participation in treatment programs. With limited state and local budgets, elected officials should turn to humane, cost-effective policies.



Limited Housing in WNY

There is still a ways to go to end homelessness in Western New York.



Right now, only **about 20% of people** experiencing homelessness can be housed through our CoC programs.



Fred's Story

Fred is a 61-year-old man who lost his wife and soon after, his home, as his single, fixed income couldn't cover rent without her.



Seeking help, he turned to a local shelter, but the congregate environment left him feeling uneasy. After a week, Fred left the shelter and moved to a local encampment.

In the encampment, Fred connected with an outreach worker who understood the homeless system and took the time to earn his trust. Here the outreach worker would engage regularly and linked Fred to community resources.

This connection became a lifeline for Fred, helping him navigate his situation and begin to rebuild his life.



The Impact of Breaking Up Encampments

When the encampment was dismantled, this left him vulnerable, and Fred lost contact with outreach services.

The loss of Fred's belongings, including his vital documents, left him unable to complete housing applications.



Accumulating fines for loitering makes it harder for him to access housing assistance.



Fred's length of homelessness will be extended because his encampment was broken up.



The Solution



To effectively end homelessness in our communities, we must commit to investing in scalable, evidence-based solutions.

Decades of research have shown that providing access to affordable housing and voluntary healthcare services is far more effective in ending homelessness and preventing housing instability than outdated, dehumanizing approaches. By focusing on these proven strategies, we can create sustainable pathways to stability and dignity for all individuals.
